

The American Goldfinch



The American Goldfinch (*Spinus tristis*) is a small bird with a beautiful song and an easily recognizable yellow plumage in summer. Goldfinches are partially migrators. As a general rule, goldfinches are present year round in the north and middle portions of the United States, and are present in the southern part of Canada during the summer. During winter, they can be found almost everywhere in the United States, as well as in some parts of Mexico. A few American Goldfinches may still be seen in the south of Quebec during the winter. Goldfinches feel most at ease in open spaces, like alongside roads, at the edge of a forest, or in trees situated in open areas. They are predominantly granivorous, although they sometimes eat insects and berries. In the wild, the American

Goldfinch feeds on seeds from plants such as nyger, dandelion, sunflower, cosmos, and ragweed. When they come to feeders, they mostly feed on nyger and sunflower seeds. They appreciate almost any type of feeder, and can even be observed feeding on the ground under feeders. They are not bothered by feeders that sway in the wind. Goldfinches are about the same size as the House Sparrow, but they are agile and have no problem eating upside down, which is something the House Sparrow has more difficulty doing. American Goldfinches molt two times a year, once in the springtime and once in the fall. The summer plumage of the male goldfinch is bright yellow, with a black patch on its head and black stripes on its tail. The female goldfinch does not have a black cap, and her plumage is more olive coloured than yellow. Both have a conical beak, orange in summer, brown in winter. During the winter season, the male and the female look alike; the plumage of both becomes browner and chamois in colour, sometimes with patches of yellow still on their faces. The American Goldfinch nests later in the year than most birds, generally between July and September. This period corresponds to the end of their molt and is marked by an abundance of food in the wild, which makes it easier for them to feed and raise their young. The Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) of North America have found that the American goldfinch population, in the South of Quebec among other places, is declining slightly.

Comfortable, safe accommodation in lodges and tented camps, food included. Group travel by overlander truck. Participants must be autonomous.




Did you know?: The American Goldfinch

- The goldfinch is part of the Fringillidae family, just like House Finch, Purple Finch, and Grosbeaks
- There are 4 sub-species of the American
 Goldfinch dispersed throughout North America
 (Spinus tristis tristis, S. t. pallidus, S. t. jewetti, S. t. salicamans)
- Goldfinches can use their feet to eat, which is something not all fringillidaes can do
- It is sometimes possible to observe that goldfinches feed themselves frenetically at feeders before a storm
- The females take care of the nest building. They sometimes undo other nests in order to use the different materials to build up their own
- The females use spider webs or silk from silkworms to ensure the cohesion of their nests.
 They can also use the inside of nyger plants as a duvet to carpet the inside of the nest
- The male feeds the female while she broods
- Brown-headed Cowbirds sometimes lay an egg in a goldfinch nest, but in most cases, the young cowbird does not survive very long, because of the granivorous diet
- The nest is constructed during the end of the summer months by the female goldfinch, in the

- branches of a deciduous bush or tree, at a height of up to 10 meters.
- The American Goldfinch will nest only once a year, but they can nest up to three times in the same year
- More than one couple can nest in the same region, forming a colony
- The brood of goldfinches can comprise between 2 and 7 eggs, and the incubation period is generally about two weeks
- On average, newborns only weigh 1g
- Fledglings, during their first month, have a unique cry that permits the father to find them easily in order to feed them
- At 11 months old, the young goldfinches, now adults, are ready to mate
- Following an open vote in 2000, the American goldfinch was declared the avian emblem of Montreal
- The American Goldfinch is also the state emblem of New Jersey, Iowa, and Washington
- Their life expectancy is usually between 3 to 6 years. Their predators include snakes, squirrels, Blue jays, and cats
- The oldest goldfinch ever recorded was 10 years and 5 months old
- Goldfinches are nomadic birds and don't really defend their territory, unless they are protecting their nest
- These goldfinches continue to learn new song sequences throughout their whole life
- As a granivore, The American
 Goldfinche helps with the dispersion of seeds in the wild

Suggestions

Good idea for the cardinal



Many solutions for keeping larger birds away from feeders also exclude the cardinal, which can be frustrating. One of our customers shared a trick she discovered that works well in her yard. She fixed adomed feeder (1) in the bottom half of a squirrel-proof cage (2) and adjusted the height of the dome so that there was just enough space, between the dome and the cage, to let the cardinal in. 
